

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An Artificial Culture of God

What a child believes by the time he is thirteen will dominate his belief system for the rest of his life and yet I fear that many of the children growing up in our churches are developing a worldview that perpetuates an artificial culture of God. By "artificial" I mean that many of our children are not getting a true picture of reality. The "culture of God" many of them are experiencing is produced and confined inside the walls of the church building. What is communicated to a child when he comes to church and hears the preacher tell the great truths of the Gospel and hears his teacher tell him that the Bible is his guide to life, and yet the Bible is never read and discussed at home? Does it not say that such things. meaning the "Gospel" and the "Bible" belong there—at the church—and that they do not affect the home environment nor how life is lived outside the church? What does a child learn when he sees his parents pray only at the church-house but never witnesses their joined and individual communication with God on a daily basis? What volumes are imprinted on the minds of our children when they hear us "Amen" the preacher who stomps his foot against sin and vet they sit next to us in our living rooms as we watch and laugh at the very things we opposed from our pews? Does this not tell him that this "culture" of prayer and Bible reading and Christian living belong only at church? That such things are performed as a religious duty in a religious environment but have no relevance to everyday life? May God forbid that by our own actions of ignorance and neglect our children may grow up without the understanding that God permeates every moment, every breath, every thought, and every action of the believer. That there is not a move made, a bite taken, not even an insignificant second that is not under the direct influence and lordship of Jesus Christ. Perish the idea that we may leave our children nice houses, names of good repute, a fortune in inheritance, and even a moral lifestyle without an eternity of hope. Shall we, by our own neglect, condemn our children's children to darkness and despair? By the heritage we pass, shall our great-grandchildren learn of our faith or shall they be left with the poor, fading rubbish of the worldly things and life we left behind? What is a Special Time?

Each week contains one Special Time—Set aside one night each week for a "special time" where you and your kids can have family fun together and learn valuable lessons from God's Word at the same time.

Teaching Method

Children only remember 10% of what they hear, 20% of what they see, and 30% of what they hear and see. They are concrete learners, which means they retain 80 to 90% of what they do, touch, smell, taste, and help teach. This is the reason that *The Family Action Pack* contains a teaching style that will help your child to:

Find it. Taste it. Touch it. Make it. Know it. Grow it. See it. Show it. Live it!

Part 2—Bedtime Stories

This section contains both fun bedtime stories about faith, trust, and running the race of life, as well as Bible Bedtime Readings.

Part 3—How to Lead Your Child to Christ

As a Christian parent, we want you to be ready to talk with your child about salvation. This method of presenting the gospel is simple and easy and uses a drawing to illustration the truths of God's Word.

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The Nine Commandments of the Special Time

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Have Fun

These sessions are set up for you to have fun leading your family into the truths of the Bible. If you're not having fun, then your children won't either.

Be Positive

Maybe you've had a rough day and all you want to do is curl up in a cave and vegetate for a little while. Then just take a deep breath, take a few moments to relax, commit this time to the Lord, and then jump in with a positive attitude. After a few minutes, a special time with your family can change how you feel.

Be Willing

Your children will only go as far as you go, which means, if you only do the activity halfway, they'll only do it halfway too. Be willing to get down on the floor, to get inside the tent, to throw a pillow or make a paper airplane. They may not remember all the things you tell them, but you're making memories that will last a lifetime.

Don't Pull Out the Pulpit

Don't preach. This should be an interactive time where the whole family can talk and discuss.

Don't Bore

Most of these sessions are short, fast-paced and to the point. Don't drag them out. Length of time and spirituality are not one-in-the-same. So don't talk long and don't pray long.

Don't Rush

Even though these sessions are set up to be short, if your family is enjoying themselves, don't cut it off too soon. Don't be in a hurry to move on to whatever comes next in your life. And if it's that favorite TV show, just remember that God gave us DVRs for a reason...right?

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Don't Make it a Burden

These sessions have been written trying to use items that most people already have in their houses. Imagine a group walking through a house and saying, "Everyone has toilet paper. So how can we use toilet paper to teach kids about Jesus?" Now you have an idea how many of these activities developed! You don't have to prepare or study to lead these. Just open up the session and get started. It's as simple as that.

Listen Up

During these sessions you'll be asking your children a lot of questions. Listen closely and be careful not to cut them off, talk down to them or correct them in a manner that will make them hesitant to share in later sessions. Sometimes we jump to fix things without fully listening.

Keep it Up

Make a commitment, put it on your calendar, and stick to it. Let this become a favorite time of the week and a top priority. After all, what is more important than what you are about to do with your family?

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Week 1—Special Time The Great Race

You will need

Anything you might need for a fun race. Your Bible marked at Hebrews 12:1-3 and 2 Timothy 4:7-8.

Choose any race in which your children and you can compete. Some ideas are listed below.

Race Options:

- Race to see who can eat a banana the fastest.
- Race to see who go the fastest with a ball or balloon between their knees..
- Race to see who run across the backyard the fastest. have them try running, hopping, bear crawling, etc..
- Race to see who can build the tallest tower out of blocks, cups or even shaving cream.

Have fun with whatever race you choose. The point isn't the race or even who wins the race. The point is for your children to understand that they are in a race in life.

<u>SAY</u>—The Bible compares the Christian life to a race but the winners in life are not the fastest or even the best...Real winners in life are those who totally live for Jesus.

Read the Hebrews 12:1-3 from your Bible.

ASK—What do you think the Bible means when it says to lay aside every weight and the sin that so easily trips you?

<u>ASK--What are some things that could hinder a person</u> from running fast in a race? (Lots of things—an untied shoe lace, a hurt foot, a hole in his path.)

<u>ASK--What are some things that could hinder a person</u> from totally living for Jesus? (Lots of things—greed, anger, disbodience, lying, selfishness...any sin and anything else that might stop a person from living a life of faith.)

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Read 2 Timothy 4:7-8 from your Bible.

<u>SAY</u>—At the end of his life the Apostle Paul could say that he had "finished the course." He had finished the race. God has a specific course for your life as well. He has great plans for you, but you'll miss out on all those great things that God has in store for you if you don't live for and follow Jesus every day.

<u>ASK</u>—If there anything in your life right now that you feel might be holding you back from fully living for Jesus? (As a parent, this is also a question that you need to be honest about. If your child has seen actions in your life that are contrary to someone following Jesus, you need to tell them that you too have had things in your life that have been holding you back and that you're willing to let go of anything that will hinder you from living for Jesus.)

<u>PRAY</u>—List prayer requests below and take time to tell the Lord that you want to live for Him without anything hindering you. If there are sins in your life, now is the time to ask for forgiveness.

Bedtime Bible Reading

After you're done, feel free to have a few more races...and at bedtime tonight, read 2 Timothy 4:7-10. These are the same verses you read above with two additional ones to hear about someone who stopped running "the race" because he cared more for this world than for following Christ.

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Week 2—Special Time Do You See What I See?

<u>You will need</u> No items are needed. A Bible marked at Hebrews 11:1

Get Started

Stare at the dots in the middle of the image below while you slowly count to 20. Then close your eyes, turn toward a light source and slightly tilt your head back. After about five seconds the image will form a picture in your mind.




<u>ASK</u>—**What did you see?** (You should have seen an image of Jesus' face.)

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<u>ASK</u>—**What did you see?** (You should have seen an image of Jesus' face.)

SAY—You saw something that wasn't there. In a similar way, faith is trusting in things that you cannot see.

Read Hebrews 11:1 from your Bible.

<u>ASK</u>—**Can you see God?** (Not with your eyes, but you know He is there.)

<u>ASK</u>—**Can you see Jesus?** (Not with your eyes, but again you know He is there. That's faith.)

Have everyone hold up one finger and gently blow on it.

ASK—**What do you feel?** (I feel the air blowing on my finger.)

ASK—What do you see? (Nothing.)

SAY—Just because you can't see something with your eyes, doesn't mean that it doesn't exist. You can't see the wind, but you know it's there and you can see what it does. You may not be able to see God, but you know He's there and you can see what He does as well.

<u>ASK</u>—What are some things that God has done in your life or our family?

SHARE—Some things that God has done in your life.

(NOTE: An atheist once asked a Christian how she knew that Jesus was real. Her answer was simply, "I know that He is real because He lives within my heart.)

<u>PRAY</u>— List prayer requests on the next page and thank God for His love and the great things that He has done in your lives.

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At bedtime tonight, read a great Bible Bedtime story from John 20:24-29 about something that happened after Jesus rose from the dead and hear what Jesus says about those who don't see, and yet believe.

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Week 3—Special Time **Balance It!**

You will need

A piece of paper and some tape or other items that can be balanced—i.e., a wooden spoon, a feather, a dial rod, etc.

A Bible marked at Hebrews 11:13-16

Get Started

Take turns trying to balance items on either your middle finger or in the palm of your hand. You can use a wooden spoon, a feather, a dial rod, or just a piece of rolled up paper that is taped to make a narrow cylinder.

The KEY: The key to balancing any item, professionals say, is to keep you eyes focused on the top of the item. Don't look at your hand. Look up.

SAY—God wants us to keep our eyes on Him too. Even though we can't see Him, He has given us the Bible that is full of promises to which we can cling. He has also given us Himself and wants us to keep Him the focus of our lives.

Read Matthew 14:22-33 from your Bible.

ASK—When did Peter start to sink? (When He took His eyes off Jesus.)

ASK—What are some ways that people we know might take their eyes off Jesus? (By letting sin have a place in their lives; by starting to live for things rather than for Christ.)

ASK—What can you do to grow closer to Jesus and to help keep your focus on Him? (Read the Bible, ask your parents to read the Bible as a family, pray together, encourage each other in Christ, go to church, etc..)

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Bedtime Bible Reading

At bedtime tonight, read a great Bible Bedtime story from 2 Kings 6:8-23 and see someone (Elisha) who saw a tough situation through the "eyes of faith." His focus was on God; not the things going on around him.

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Week 4—Special Time **\$pin**

You will need A Bible marked at Jude 24.

SPIN—Part 1

Have your family stand in a circle, hold hands and time yourselves to see how fast you can spin around five (or ten) times without letting go of each other.

Sit down in a circle and put a Bible in the middle.

SAY—We're going to rest for a minute and then try that again.

ASK—What is your favorite thing that we do together as a family?

ASK—What do you wish we did more of together as a family?

ASK—If you could change anything about our family, what would it be?

SPIN—Part 2

Spin around and time yourselves again.

Sit down in a circle and AGAIN put a Bible in the middle.

ASK—Why do you think I put a Bible in the middle of our family?

SAY—I put it there because we want everything that happens in our lives and our family to center around God and the truths of His Word. We want Him to be the center of everything, and letting God be at the center isn't about going to church or doing things for Him. It's about knowing Jesus, loving Him and following Him every day.

Week 4—Special Time

You will need A Bible marked at Jude 24.

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ASK—Is there anything that we can do, as your parents, to help you follow Jesus more closely and know Him better? (Be open to some very honest answers.)

SAY—God has a plan for our family and God has a very special plan for you but we'll miss out on God's great plans if we "let go" of following Jesus. When we were spinning we had to hold onto each other.

Have your family hold hands again.

SAY—God wants us to hold onto each other and God wants us to hold onto Him. We need to always make sure that everything we say and do in our family is right in the eyes of God. We want Jesus to be at the center of all of our lives.

SPIN-Part 3

SAY—Let's see if we can beat our best time...and remember to "hold on."

Read from the book of Jude, verse 24 (Jude 24). 5AY—Let's make this verse our prayer today.

<u>PRAY</u>—Pray Jude 24 for your family and ask God to help you always to keep Him the center of everything your family says and does.

At bedtime tonight, take prayer requests from your children, read Matthew 6:7-8 and then let everyone have a chance to pray.

Week 5—Special Time Walking Straight

You will need:
A straight line.
A Bible marked at Joshua 1:7 and Proverbs 4:25-27

Find a straight line, or several straight lines in your house. These could be lines in a tile floor, a line along the edge of the carpet, a line in the concrete of your driveway, the edge of a back porch, etc. Let everyone in your family take turns walking along the line. Tell them to be careful not to "step to the left or the right." If your children are young, ask them to raise their right hand and then their left hand. Then explain to them what you mean by not stepping to the "left or the right" (i.e., to stay on course, not to wander off one way or another).

Read Joshua 1:7 from your Bible

Walk the Line Again

Let everyone have a second turn. This time, stand at the end of the line and ask them to look at you as they walk.

SAY—God always wants us to keep our eyes on Him.

ASK—Did keeping your eyes on me make it easier or harder to walk the line?

SAY—When you keep your focus on Christ, it helps you to keep walking on the path of how God wants you to live and not straying to the right or to the left,

Read Proverbs 4:25-27 from your Bible

Walk the Line a Third Time

At bedtime tonight, read Deuteronomy 5:30-33, another don't "turn to the left or right" passage and encourage your child to always walk with God and to keep his feet from doing evil and going where they shouldn't go.

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Week 6—Special Time Fight for the Faith

You will need Pillows.

A Bible marked at Hebrews 11:32-36, 38-40

Pillow Fight—Part 1

Have a family pillow fight—Set boundaries, clear an area and have fun. You may also want to set limits depending on the age of your children.

Take a break and sit on your pillows.

SAY: All the heroes we have been learning about at home and at church during the past few weeks had to fight for their faith. These were not perfect people—they made lots of mistakes and faced a lot of tough times, but through it all they wanted to follow and serve God.

ASK: If you could go anywhere in the world, where would you go? (Would you like to go on a boat? To go skiing? To go to an amusement park? A zoo? What about going somewhere where you knew you would be lacking what you need to live, afflicted, mistreated, wandering in deserts and mountains and caves and holes in the ground?)

SAY. That describes some of what these heroes of the faith faced.

READ: Hebrews 11:32-36, 38-40 from your Bible.

ASK: Why do you think anyone would choose to suffer these things? (Because they were living for something more important. That's why the Bibles says that these were "men of whom the world wasn't worthy," because they weren't living for this world. They were living for God. The weren't living for this life but the life to come.)

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SAY. God always takes care of His children, but following God isn't always easy. These people in the Bible are great examples of how good people can endure bad things. With God, you can overcome anything. You can fight for the faith and always do what is right.

<u>Pillow Fight—Part 2</u> Have some more pillow fighting fun.

<u>PRAY</u>—List your family's prayer requests below and thank God for the blessings He has given us.

Bedtime Bible Reading

At bedtime tonight, read 2 Timothy 4:7-8. These are the same verses you read in Week 1. Not only could the Apostle Paul say that he had finished the race, but that he had also "fought the good fight." He was at the end of his life when he wrote this, and looking back, he had finished what God had planned for him. He had followed God's path without stepping to the right or to the left.

<u>SHARE</u> with your child your desire for them also to always live for and follow lesus.

And when we don't have all the answers, we know that we can continue to trust God because He sees what we don't. And by faith, we too can see beyond the situation.

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
Step One: God Loves You

How to Lead Your Child to Christ

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
Draw the following:





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Explain that God loves the person you are talking to and that He wants a personal relationship with them. Instead of writing "You" and "Me" under the figures, write your name and the name of the person to whom you are talking.

John 3:16 – "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son that whosoever believes in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."


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Step Two: Sin—Our Problem

How to Lead Your Child to Christ

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
Explain that we have a problem. Our problem is sin and sin is anything we do that is wrong.

ASK: **Have you ever done something wrong?** (Be careful not to ask, "Have you ever sinned?" Some children aren't familiar with the term "sin." Ask, "Have you ever done anything wrong?")

Explain that everyone is a sinner and sin (the wrong things we do) separates us from God, just like in the drawing. "Picture this as a Grand Canyon or Great Wall that separates you from God. You see, God is perfect. He's on this side. Are we perfect? No, because we've all done wrong things."

Romans 3:23 - "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God."

Add to the Drawing:



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Important Note about the Stage of Accountability

On *Step Two* of the drawing if a child cannot yet discern right from wrong, he has not yet reached the stage of accountability and is not ready to give his life to Christ. In this event, plant a seed for the future:

"You know, Johnny, there will be a time in your life when you do something that's wrong. When that time comes, know that God still loves you and has made a way for you to go to heaven. And, Johnny, if you ever start thinking about heaven and how you can go there, come talk to me."

At this time DO NOT pray with him that he'll accept Christ when the time is right. Many people do this without realizing that they are dealing with a young child who may only remember that he talked with somebody about Jesus and someone prayed with him. We don't want to do anything that might cause doubt in the future.

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
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Step Three: The Punishment and the Gift

Add to the drawing:



Romans 6:23 - "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord."

Explain that there is a punishment for the wrong things we do. This punishment is eternal separation from God in a place called "hell." God didn't create hell for us, but for the devil and the other angels that rebelled against Him. But when we sinned and rebelled against God, this became our just punishment too.

ASK: But where does God want us to go? (To Heaven.)


But just because He wants us to go there, doesn't mean that we automatically will.

Importants When speaking with a child, do not omit mentioning hell because it is a part of the Gospel. However, do not focus on this. Your aim is not to scare your child, but to inform them that there is a punishment for sin and a gift that is heaven. Also, you may need to distinguish with some children that "hell" is a "bad" word if you hit your thumb with a hammer and then say it, but it is also a place.

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
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Step Four: One Way

Add to the drawing:



Explain that Jesus was God and came to earth as a man. He lived a perfect life, and when He died, God punished Him for all the wrong things you and I would ever do. This is how much God loves you and this is the reason Jesus came, to make a way for you to go to heaven. (Refer to the sin block.) If this is the Grand Canyon of sin, Jesus built a bridge across it by dying and paying the price for your sins, but Jesus didn't stay dead. Three days later, God raised Him from the dead and He's alive today. That's why He's the only way to go to heaven.


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John 14:6 - "Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life; no man comes to the Father except through me."

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Step Five: Gift Illustration

Add NOTHING to the drawing:

Explain that salvation is a gift.

Ephesians 2:8-9 — "For by grace you have been saved through faith and that not of yourselves; it is a gift of God. Not of works, lest any man should boast."

(You can also refer back to Romans 6:23)

Gift Illustrations

Let's say this pen (the pen you've been writing with) is worth a million dollars and I come to you one day and say, "I'd like to give this to you." Is it yours yet? What would you have to do to get it? (If they don't immediately say, "I have to reach out and take it," guide them toward that answer.)

Like a gift, you can accept it, or you can say no. A gift can't be earned, just like heaven – you can't be good enough to get to heaven. *(Refer back to the drawing)* There is only one way across that Grand Canyon of sin, and that's Jesus.

Now with the pen, it would be easy for you to take it. All you have to do is reach out and it's yours. With God's gift, it's a little different – You can't physically reach out and take it, but in the Bible God told us how we can accept this gift. You see, Jesus paid the price for our sins; what we have to do is give our lives to Him and accept Him as our Lord and Savior.

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This is how a person can give his life to Jesus:

Admit that we have sinned and be willing to turn from our sin.

Believe that Jesus is God's Son who died and was raised from the dead.

Call on the Lord, confess our sins, and commit our life to Him.

The Bible says:

Romans 10:9 - "That if you will confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved."

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Step Six: The Invitation

How to Lead Your Child to Christ

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BIG QUESTIONS:

ASK: Does all this make sense to you?

ASK: Would you like to give your life to Christ?

If NO, ask why not?

If **YES**, then let them pray aloud or lead them in a prayer similar to the following: (Remember, there is no magic prayer. Words don't save a person; God knows what is in their heart.)

Dear Jesus,

Thank you for dying for me and offering me heaven. I'm sorry for the wrong things I've done. Please save me and be my Lord and Savior. I give you my life. Thank you for saving me.

In Jesus Name, Amen.

After your child accepts Jesus, immediately congratulate him and give him a big hug. Let him know how proud and happy you are. Then encourage him to continue growing with Jesus, to make his decision public at church, and to follow the Lord in baptism.

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
